
- Allen County Pop: 300,000

 - 40,000 misdemeanors & infractions






Quadrant 4




Part One Crimes




Returning Offenders: Generally

- 95% return to community
- 63% return to prison within 1-3 years
 - New offenses
 - Technical offenses




Returning Offenders: Allen County

- 200 serious violent offenders return to Allen County/year
 - 74 to Quadrants 1, 2 and 3 (37%)
 - 126 to Quadrant 4 (63%)
- (Q4 = 17% of county population)






